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Highlights for 2009

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Message from the Chair of the Board of Trustees

Isis was founded in 1974 on the premise that women everywhere shared a common factor—that their voices were not being heard on issues that affected them the most. Since then, much has changed. We now have a wide range of technologies where women can express themselves. We have mainstream media where women are a more common sight, and there are women in virtually every sector of life whether its politics, government, science, business, the military, sports, etc. But some pretty basic ones still remain.

Isis International too, has grown and diversified since its founding but it continues to understand that women need to talk about issues, and that it needs to be through their own perspectives, with their own voices, on their own terms. Sifting, funneling, censoring, deleting and shutting out women's voices are unacceptable and violate international human rights standards.

In 2009 we learned that change, while scary, is not bad. In fact difficulties can only make us more creative, while survival makes us stronger. The current times warrant that as women—and as a feminist organisation we adapt—we reinvent ourselves, and like a breathing organism, we shrink and expand, and may shrink again. But, we are confident that we will always expand again. Yet, we do not lose sight of our mandate that as a feminist information-communication organisation, our job is to continue to provide a space where women's voices can be heard, where women can strengthen their capacities to grow in their field of informing others, and where we investigate and interrogate those issues that affect women in our region.

Isis, through years of research in the region, has found that women rely on radio more than any other form of communication technology to get their information. However, mainstream radio does not always address what they need to know, and in many communities it is community radio.

In 2009, Isis conducted many radio trainings where women from the Asia-Pacific including some from Africa attended in order to strengthen their own community radio programmes that give information they need in such situations as after a disaster, during a drought, or to discuss the current events of their community.

Isis has initiated its own research agenda and at the same time developed partnerships with women's groups locally, regionally and internationally to look at current events affecting women and their communities. It is from this perspective that Isis engaged in action research and capacity building on women's participation in peace building in Philippines and Indonesia. Pioneering efforts include a study on—and with—the lesbian, gay and transgender communities on issues affecting the LGBT communities in the Asian region, building solidarity bridges with marginalised populations, and working with them to use info-com technologies and strategies to get their stories out.

Isis, as a recognised information communication organisation has taken on leadership roles in international and regional foras such as the preparatory meetings for the Copenhagen Summit on Climate Change, the FAO World Summit on Food Security in Rome, the NGO Asia-Pacific Regional Forum in preparation for Beijing+15 (held in Manila) and UNESCAP Meeting (in Thailand). At these meetings, Isis used ICT as a tool to reach-out, and on a day-to-day basis, keep women who were unable to attend these important international foras, updated.

2010 proves to be more exciting. As a 36 year old organisation, Isis makes neither excuses nor apologies for it. Isis is a mature organisation with young and vibrant women who continue to build on its organisational strengths and find new ways of doing things. Isis' goal is to ensure that there is always an opportunity, a platform, a venue where women's voices can be heard, where they can go to strengthen their skills and capacities in the use of information and communication technologies. In its trainings Isis goes beyond the technical capacity building but incorporates tools, frameworks, and knowledge for women to improve their skills as activists, mediators and leaders. Isis intends to formalise this capacity-building into an Activist School for Feminist Development Communication for 2010.

As Chairperson of the Board of Trustees and on behalf of the Isis Board, it is with pride that I ask you to review our annual report and to continue with us on this journey into 2010 and beyond.

Message from the **Executive Director**

With pleasure I present to you the 2009 Annual Report of Isis International. This report reflects the longstanding commitments of this 36 year old feminist organisation in advancing women's rights and gender equality through participation in media and communication, as well as highlights of its latest achievements in voicing women's struggles in the most prominent issues such as peace and conflict, climate change, food security, fundamentalisms and intolerance, among many others.

The year 2009 is marked with the multiple crises, from the financial crisis to the food crisis to the climate crisis and more. Through its flagship magazine *Women in Action* and various communication works, Isis International not only featured the impact of these crises on women, but also the women's initiatives and coping strategies in response to these crises which should be integrated in the policy-making processes and implementation to address these issues, at community, national, regional, and international levels, including at the various UN venues, such as Commission on Status of Women, Beijing+15 process, and UN Framework Convention on Climate Change negotiations.

In the same principle of voicing the concerns of women and marginalised communities, Isis International conducted the media and communication capacity training on how to use media and communication tools to advocate for their issues and moblise their communities for women's groups/networks and community media practitioners from Asia Pacific region, including Philippines, Indonesia, East Timor, China, India, Laos, Cambodia, Fiji, and many other countries. The range of issues covered violence against women, women's participation in peace building and disaster management, poverty alleviation, and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) rights.

Yes, the world has changed and it will continue to change. Isis is amongst the first women's organisations to use computer and internet technology. Today its website receives millions of hits each year, and the number is still increasing. Communications is a fundamental tool in building movements, which includes both traditional forms like face to face discussions, printed media, radio and video, and new ICTs and internet-based tools (such as website, blogs, listservs, social networks, etc.). As an information and communication organisation, Isis exerts its endeavour in the new era of information society to contribute to dynamic women's movements, especially those from Global South.

Isis is a strong believer and an advocate of sharing information for free, because the information we produce and disseminate is created and owned by women and activists from all over the world. Thus, we owe many thanks to all those who shared with us their stories, critiques and perspectives on various issues, contributors of WiA magazine and We! newsletter; participants and facilitators of the workshops and seminars; as well as millions of website users. Their contribution and participation have made this women's space meaningful, crucial and empowering.

I truly appreciate the political guidance and continuous support from General Members and Board of Trustees and the commitments and excellent work of all the staff, partners and volunteers in 2009. Last but not least, I would like to thank our funding partners. With their support, Isis maintains its important activism of struggling for equality, justice and diversity in this turbulent world.

Women Making Airwaves for Peace Seminar

(16-20 October 2009, Manila, Philippines)

Noor Chasanah was among the 30 women community radio practitioners that participated in the intermovement, inter-regional and inter-active 5-day seminar on community radio, entitled Women Making Airwaves for Peace (WMAP). Women from ten countries of South-East Asia and the Pacific as well as from China, Nepal and Sudan, participated in this cross-cultural sharing of experiences on the use of community radio for women's empowerment in peace building and conflict resolution processes. Immediately applying their newly acquired skills, the participants produced three 45-minute radio shows with radio features, radio drama, roundtable discussions, public service announcements, interviews and original compositions of WMAP songs about peace building and disaster response. WMAP participants were able to present some of the radio productions in a workshop they conducted during the Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15, 22-24 October 2009, held in Manila, Philippines.

Based on the evaluation forms completed at the end of the seminar and their feedback, participants felt

empowered from the exchange, the interactive discussions and the new skills they obtained during the seminar. They also claimed to be very motivated to share the learnings with other women in their community and radio station. Some especially mentioned the importance of tools like the *Gender Policy for Community Radio* and the guide on *Engendering Peace Journalism* to strengthen them and their programmes within their radio stations to be able to provide more useful information to the women listeners in their communities.

Cristina Ximenes Belo, of Radio Rakambia in East Timor told us how important the session on *Gender Policy for Community Radio* and its implementation was for her. In her radio station, women have been trying to participate more actively in decision-making but the male leaders would not let them. Even when the *Gender Policy* was distributed in several AMARC events that were attended by male representatives from Radio Rakambia, she was never given a copy.



Understanding Media for Advancing Feminist Advocacy on the Elimination of Violence Against Women and Children

(11-14 June 2009, Saitama, Japan)

Isis International is a long-standing member of the Asia Pacific Women's Watch (APWW), a women's network that actively collaborates with and monitors the United Nations (UN), national governments, as well as feminist and social movements in advancing women's human rights. Isis International conducted this workshop to provide the APWW members with skills on the effective use of media to reach the multiple development actors (such as policymakers, women organisations, civil society groups and the public at large) and advance feminist advocacies especially to address issues of violence against women and children (VAWC). The workshop focused on three main areas: understanding media; bridging the gap between NGOs and media, and media strategies and working plan development. Participants developed their own media strategies and working plans according to their specific issues by applying the knowledge and skills learned, and the experiences shared in the workshop.

Three months after this training, SEWA launched their own radio "Rudi No Radio", which is entirely managed by women.

SEWA Community Radio Management and Advanced Radio Production

(17-26 August 2009, Gujarat, India)

Thirty members of the Self Employed Women's

Association (SEWA) participated in the Community Radio Management and Advanced Radio Production training. This training enabled the commencement of SEWA's own radio, 'Rudi No Radio' (Rudi's radio), broadcasting by November 2009. 'Rudi No Radio' is entirely managed by women, who have had no formal training in mass media. The station will run in local folk-style and the episodes will cater to rural listeners focusing on developmental issues such as agriculture, health, water and literacy. In the latter part of 2009, SEWA also conducted a 2-day training for volunteers where the training inputs from the Isis module were utilized.



Chinese media organisations and representatives from women's NGOs shared their experience in reportage on gender based violence issues.

Gender training for journalists on Violence Against Women

(9-10 September, Beijing, China)

Isis International co-facilitated gender training for journalists on how to report on gender based violence. The training was organised by Combating Domestic Violence Network (Research Center) of the China Law Society, a Chinese NGO founded in 2000 to fight against domestic violence through research, advocacy and education. Twenty participants including journalists from various Chinese media organisations and representatives from women's NGOs shared their experiences in reportage on gender based violence issues, as well as good practices and lessons learned in media advocacy. Participants drafted and coordinated the media advocacy plan for the "Global 16 Days Campaign Against Violence Against Women" in November and December, 2009.



Sagada Radio Strategic Planning

(19-20 December 2009, Sagada, Mt. Province, Philippines)

In collaboration with Northern Media and Information Network (NMIN) in Baguio and the Montaniosa Research and Development Center (MRDC) in Sagada, Isis International conducted a training workshop participated by 12 people who will be spearheading the establishment of the Sagada Radio in the Philippines.

The planning workshop resulted in the development of the Mission, Vision and Objectives; the draft structure for the radio; editorial guidelines; code of conduct; and the detailed action plan for the set up of the community radio including community participation and mobilisation. The radio will be officially launched in June 2010.

Planning for the programme format of Rainbow Radio, which was launched during the LGBT Pride March on 8 December 2009.

Rainbow Rights Radio Production

(5-6 & 12-13 September 2009,

Manila, Philippines)

Rainbow Rights is a group of mainly

lesbians who are advocating for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) rights in Manila and the rest of the Philippines. The 4-day training in radio production was attended by10 participants. It enabled Rainbow Rights to commence the "Rainbow Radio", which was launched during the LGBT Pride March on December 8, 2009. It broadcasts every Saturday in Metro Manila and can also be heard on air internationally via the Internet. This is the first LGBT radio programme in the Philippines and they have received many positive responses, including feedback from Singapore. Now, "Rainbow Radio" is supporting LGBT groups in other provinces in the country.

Thateng Ethnic Community Radio for Developmént

(July 2009, Sekong, Laos)

Thateng District in the south of Laos is a very rural area with a number of villages without roads. With the newly constructed studio for Thateng Ethnic Community Radio for Development (TECRD) in Sekong, Laos, UNDP Laos invited Isis International trainer to conduct two workshops. The first, a 2-day training on strategic planning, was attended by 99 participants. An action plan towards financial sustainability of TECRD was developed. The second workshop on radio programming was conducted over 3 days and was attended by 45 participants, 25% were women. Women's issues were discussed. Participants drafted the broadcast schedule for TECRD, and produced the first station ID and 5 live programmes. Topics included: laws on land management, how to increase rice production, how to become a culture village, gender policies for community radio, and local news.

production & dissemination of multimedia materials on the women's movements

Women in Action (WiA) magazine

The WiA magazine is Isis International's longstanding publication which since the 1970s, has facilitated information exchange among women's movements, especially in light of developments recognising women's rights. It is a space for feminists and activists in the global South, especially the Asia-Pacific region, to articulate and strengthen gender analysis on various issues. The WiA is distributed globally to individual subscribers, women's organisations, social movements, media institutions, libraries, academe, information and communication technology advocates, development cooperation agencies and government bodies. Some WiA issues are part of academic readings particularly in courses on Gender and Development, Communication Arts and International Studies. It has also been used as educational or campaign materials by grassroots women's groups by reprinting and translating into local languages.

About one thousand copies per issue are produced, mailed out, as well as distributed in relevant conferences such as the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) intersessional meetings, the People's Forum for Food Sovereignty, the Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15, and others. Chapters of the Food Crisis issue were reprinted over multiple weeks in the Women's UN Report Network (WUNRN).

For 2009, three WiA issues were produced:

1. Harvest Reaped but Hard to Reach: The Food Crisis and Women in the **Global South**

This issue examined the varying impacts of the food crisis on Southern women and communities, highlighting compounding factors such as people's ever-decreasing access to land, climate change and the recent global financial crisis. Using a gender perspective, it took a

3. Multiple Intolerance, Mounting Resistance

This issue examines the emerging and old forms of intolerance based on the intersectionality of identities, emanating from gender, race, ethnicity, age, religion, class, caste, citizenship and location, among many others. The magazine also analyses the profound impact of restrictive security measures to feminist and social movements, and evaluates forms of intolerance within otherwise progressive social movements.

We! Online news

We! is a bi-monthly online news bulletin that provides information on women and communications advocacies. It is downloadable for free on the Isis International website and it is distributed via email to subscribers worldwide. In 2009, 18 We! issues were published. Some of the topics and issues covered were on war and conflict, marriage migration, climate change, violence against women and coverage of discussions that took place at significant conferences. We! also comes out with a We! Flash for immediate reaction to highly contentious issues. Often, entire or parts of the articles and statements from We! are reprinted in other publications. Some We! articles have been translated from English into other languages or used as sources by women's organisations and activists to feed into their advocacies, research and activism.

The Isis International website makes accessible its community and independent media products including WIA, We!, other Isis publications and primers, training kits and modules such as the Women Making Airwaves for Peace project including radio productions, conference reports and on site reportage, and podcasts. These materials are downloadable for free in accordance with the creative commons philosophy that promotes the free sharing of information.

The Isis International website also hosts email lists and websites of other organisations including the Asia Pacific Women's Watch (APWW), a list of over 500 women's groups in the region and Women and Gender Institute (WAGI), based in Miriam College, Philippines and the Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15 that was held in October 2009.

Women's Participation in Peace Building

(June 2008 to May 2010)

This is a two-year (2008-2010) and two-country (Philippines and Indonesia) research and capacity building

project that aims to create an enabling environment where women can actively participate in and significantly contribute to peace and conflict resolution processes, and to build the capacities of women in peace building processes. Using the innovative framework of cultural politics, the project will examine women's everyday realities as they are linked to the issues of conflict resolution and peace building, and to the United Nations Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) 1325 on increasing women's participation in peace negotiations. Focusing on conflict areas in Indonesia and the Philippines, the project is carried out in partnership with the Centre for Eastern Indonesia Studies, Indonesia and the BALAY Rehabilitation Centre Inc., Philippines. For 2009, the project focused on action research on cultural politics of peace. In small group community discussions and key informant interviews, women spoke about their experiences of conflict and peace building within and outside of their communities, their visions, values and symbols of peace, the value of everyday experiences vis-a-vis the UNSCR 1325, and how their experiences relate to the macro-conditions.

"My only wish is for my children to finish college, I don't want them to experience the hard life that I had. I want them to finish college, and not have to stop in between. They know that it is my only wish for them." (Informal Worker, Mother and Wife, Philippines)

"Sometimes I wish, they would think about all the people in Pikit and in Aleosan, how so many they are, and for the mayor to say at one point, 'You don't need to be rebels anymore, you can have livelihood here, and have work if you wanted'. It's a small view that I hold, but maybe a thought that could help someday." (Leader and Organic Farmer, Philippines)

"As we learned in the seminars we attended, unity is what is emphasised. So even in playing games, I make it a

point not to take sides during differences. We need to acknowledge mistakes made, whether we are Christians or Muslims, and even if we are related. We are all equal. I tell them this, and I make them sit altogether instead of in groups such as Christians sitting together, Muslims sitting together, and then the Indigenous children also need to sit here. This togetherness helps bridge understanding that sometimes depends on the children's attitude." (Teacher and Community Leader, Philippines)

"Before the conflict, I never cared about the world outside my room. So I didn't know what was happening outside. When the conflict happened, it was unclear. Only the ones who can survive will survive. Many women took on a role and I joined them. My first social activity was with the youth. Together with my friends in church, I evacuated the refugees. I thought it was extraordinary. It was a huge task for me coming from a closed world. I learned a lot from the people I worked with and helped. I also learned to read the situation and know many people. I have never met so many people at once." (Activist in Tentena, Indonesia)

"Before the conflict, I was involved with the Aisyah women's organisation, and I was involved in many activities and with other women's groups, even though my role was limited in the local area. After the conflict, I bloomed. I wanted to learn how I could get involved in a larger scale and join humanitarian activities that had very complex issues." (Actvist and Mother, Poso Kota, Indonesia)

"In 1998, my child died during an evacuation. She was 4 months old. We were evacuated at 3 in the morning to the forest in the hill. It was raining and my child who had no blanket had a heart attack. I was in such a panic that I still breast fed her. During the conflict, my brother was gashed several times and burnt alive. Fortunately he survived and is now healthy. He was saved by our Muslim friends. It felt like a job...my child died and my brother a victim. But God replaced it all. Now I have three children and my brother survived. The conflict also tightened my relationship with my parents in law." (Teacher, Mother and Activist, Tentena, Indonesia).

The findings from the research phase will contribute to the second phase activities which will focus on the development of communication materials on UNSCR 1325, and capacity building for community women leaders to utilize the various media and communication tools to participate in the formal peace negotiations as well as practice their formal and informal leadership in the everyday life in their respective communities.

Social Representation of LBT Issues and Concerns

(June 2009 to April 2010)

Isis is conducting a 14-month action research

that examines the understanding of lesbian, bisexual, and transgender people's (LBT) issues and concerns and how they are positioned in Philippine feminist movements, particularly in the areas of sexual health and violence against women, and seeks to achieve affinity politics in feminist movements. Aside from an extensive review of literature, the research has employed focus group discussions and key informant interviews with LBT organisations and LBT individuals who have had previous participation/leadership roles in LBT organising and advocacy work and with feminist and women's health organisations. Thus far, initial learnings identified that while feminist groups have attempted to include lesbians and bisexuals within the scope of their services on health and violence, they have also felt the limitations of their assumptions and understanding of the sexual diversity and its implications on their issues of health and violence. On the other hand, lesbians, bisexuals and transgendered people struggle to define and understand each others common issues and diverse concerns. Transgendered groups, seemingly young and new in LGBT organising and advocacy but have worked hard on issues of transphobia, discrimination and understanding of gender identity and sexual orientation.

Global Report on the Status of Women in the News Media

(February 2009 to June 2010)

Isis International took on the role of Regional Research Coordinator for the International Women's Media Foundation's (IWMF) research project *Global Report on the Status of Women in the News Media*. As the regional coordinator, Isis collaborated with researchers from China, Japan, Malaysia, Philippines and South Korea to conduct the survey on the status of women in the news media organisations, including their working conditions, salary and benefits, as well as the gender policy in respective media organisations. The final global report will be launched in 2011.

Beijing+15 Process

With its consultative status (category II) at the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), Isis International has actively engaged in the process of monitoring the implementation of Beijing Platform for Action (BPfA), the outcome document of the 4th UN World Conference on Women in Beijing in 1995.

The 53rd session of UN Commission on Status of Women (CSW53)



(March 2009, New York, USA)

Isis International conducted three presentations on the issues of women's participation in peace building, media and communication strategies to address violence against women, and men's involvement against gender based violence in the parallel events organised by APWW and the Philippine governmental delegation. Isis also contributed to the drafting of the APWW statement that was distributed and presented in the plenary session during CSW53.

Experts Meeting at the UNESCAP

(May 2009, Bangkok, Thailand)

This meeting was organised by the Social Development Commission of the United Nations Economic and Social

Commission for Asia Pacific (UNESCAP) in preparation of the High Level Intergovernmental Meeting on the review of the implementation of the BPfA that was held on 16-18 November 2009, in Bangkok, Thailand. Isis International was invited as an observer and NGO representative to assess the past five years since the Beijing+10. This meeting was attended by ten experts from Asia and the Pacific, representing NGOs, the academe and the UN agencies. Isis gave the inputs on the emerging issues regarding Section J of BPfA on Women and Media. Isis wrote an article regarding this experts' meeting and posted it online and disseminated it via We!, Isis' online bulletin and listserv. Isis also contributed to the planning and organising of the Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15 by sharing the report with the Asia Pacific Women's Watch (APWW) members during the APWW Steering Committee meeting held on 11-14 June 2009, in Saitama, Japan.

APWW Steering Committee Meeting

(11-14 June 2009, Saitama, Japan)

Isis International is a member of the Asia Pacific Women's Watch (APWW), an Asia Pacific network that monitors women related UN agreements. Its Steering Committee is regional with Isis serving as a regional representative and with the particular role of providing the network with information and communication support, including hosting and maintaining the APWW website and apww-meet listserv. Isis also contributed to APWW's preparations for participation at the AP NGO Forum, held in October 2009, Manila, Philippines.





Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15

(22-25 October 2009, Manila, Philippines)

Isis conducted a podcast of all the plenary sessions as well as produced daily articles. These were all posted and uploaded on the AP NGO Conference website, the APWW website and the Isis International website. Aside from being part of the organising committee, Isis International was also an active participant of the conference. Isis conducted four workshop sessions on the following topics: gender, media and ICT; marriage migration; lesbian, gay, bisexuals and transgender (LGBT) rights; and community radio for disaster management. Isis' Executive



Director, Cai Yiping was selected by the organisers as a speaker for the plenary on Feminisms Through Generations, which included other known feminists such as: Patricia Licuanan, Chairperson, UN Commission on the Status of Women (1994-1996); Leticia Ramaos-Shahani, Secretary General, Third World Conference on Women, Nairobi, Kenya (1985); and Nighat Said Khan, ASR Resource Centre (Pakistan).

UNESCAP High Level Intergovernmental Meeting

(16-18 November 2009, Bangkok, Thailand)

More than two hundred women and men from governmental and non-governmental organisations participated in the discussion and debate of this fifteen year review of the implementation of the Beijing Platform for Action. Isis International conducted the podcast of this three-day meeting, as well as produced

articles highlighting some major issues such as: the successes and challenges in the regional implementation of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW); and, on the regional campaign to end violence against women. Coordinating with the Isis staff in the Manila office, this information was simultaneously disseminated online and amongst Isis networks through mailing lists services and via we!, Isis' online bulletin.

Climate Change and Food Security

UNFCCC (29 September to 9 October 2009, Bangkok, Thailand; 7-18 December 2009, Copenhagen, Denmark)

Isis International performed information and communication work at the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) intersessional meeting, otherwise known as 15th Conference of Parties (COP15) on 29 September- 9 October 2009 in Bangkok, Thailand; and at the Copenhagen Summit in 7-18 December 2009 in Copenhagen, Denmark. Isis International joined this process primarily through the Gender CC (Women for Climate Justice). Isis participated in the women's caucus regularly performing media work for the caucus. Isis International also drafted the language on gender in key documents particularly the issues of adaptation, technology transfer, finance and most importantly the shared vision or what is suppose to be the preamble of the outcome document of COP15. This process began in the Bangkok conference through to the conference held in Copenhagen, where the statement was delivered in the plenary by the Women and Gender Constituency. Isis International also joined the marches including the women's march and other civil society events.

People's Forum for Food Sovereignty (13-17 November 2009, Rome, Italy)

People's Forum for Food Sovereignty 2009 is an autonomous and self-organised space that debates and articulates processes and proposals on Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Policies as an input to the action of the social movements and to the Intergovernmental Summit. At this Parallel Event to the World Summit on Food Security, attended by social movements, Isis participated in the women's caucus and shared the WiA on "The food Crisis and Women in the Global South" and the statement of the Asia Pacific NGO Forum on Beijing+15. Isis also discussed further collaborations with women's groups and networks, such as WOCAN and Huairou Commission, to strategise the advocacies on interlinking gender, food security and climate change at the Copenhagen Summit (December 2009) and UNCSW54 on Beijing+15 (March 2010).

Media and Communication

AMARC-WIN Networking

As one of the speakers during this

Isis continues to pursue its vital role in the World Association of Community Radio Broadcasters (AMARC) of bringing the gender perspective and promoting gender equality which has contributed to strengthening the World Association of Community Radio Broadcasters Women's International Network (AMARC-WIN) and its members. Collaborative activities between Isis International and the AMARC-WIN include the broadcasting of March 8 women's events; the work of the Women Making Airwaves for Peace (October 2009), and the re-launching of the Gender Policy for Community Radio (March 2009).



Mekong Media Forum (9-12 December 2009, Chiang Mai, Thailand)

Organised by Inter Press Service (IPS) Asia-Pacific and Probe Media Foundation, this Forum brought together 150 Mekong journalists, media professionals and resource persons to discuss and debate media issues and reflect on the changing media environment in Mekong region (namely, Thailand, Lao PDR, China, Vietnam, Myanmar and Cambodia).

Isis was invited to speak in three sessions: "Talking,

Thinking, Reporting Gender", "Reporting Sexuality in the Mekong", and another session on community radio, in collaboration with UNDP Laos. Isis shared the insights on how media accept/imbibe/understand gender awareness in their work, where improvements have been made, where the challenges are, where the situation is, and the kind of capacity-building perhaps needed. The participants also appreciated Isis' call to give more importance to civil media and community media and the need to engender journalism.

Women's Human Rights

International Leadership Development Meeting and From Abortion Rights to Social Justice: Building the Movement for **Reproductive Freedom Conference**

(31 March to 5 April 2009, Hampshire University, USA)

This International Leadership Development Meeting (ILDM) brought together representatives from 10 organisations/regional networks working on leadership development in the fields of reproductive health and sexual rights. Isis spoke during international roundtables and workshop sessions at this conference and participated in interactive discussions with US-based activists on issues such as abortion access, occupied bodies/occupied territories, voices against state violence, women and globalisation, and youth activism. Isis International expanded its networks with women's groups and youth groups in Africa, Latin America and Europe.

Isis is an active and strategic member of the International Lesbian and Gay Association (ILGA), through its work of bringing feminist analyses to the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) community. Its work is directed at addressing the challenges and barriers that have prevented the building of alliances amongst women's, human rights and LGBT movements on the issues of sex and sexuality. By attending the LGBT and Human Rights training organised by the Swedish Association for Sexuality Education (RFSU) for LGBT activists, NGO representatives, educators, policy makers, and media professionals from selected Asian and African countries, Isis obtained


Staff Develpment

Isis International carried out both internal and external staff development activities. Such activities have focused on, reflected direct links with, and exhibited immediate usefulness to the work of Isis.

Internal staff development activities included: Resultsbased Management Training - conducted by the Isis Executive Director and attended by all the staff and Radio Training - conducted by the Isis Community and

Independent Media Programme Officer and attended by all staff. Other training attended by specific members of staff (identified depending on their roles and positions in Isis) were: content management system software of the web server upgrading,

The Isis International Women's House is the institution's small income generating project. For 2009 it has contributed to the institutional operational fund by 6%. In keeping to the principles of a women centered safe space, culturally sensitive, environmentally sound and affordable rates, Isis International Women's House provides meeting rooms and spaces including an outdoor patio area that can also be used for social events; a recording studio; and office or desk spaces for like-minded organisations. In 2009, the Women's International House commenced hosting the office of the Inter Press Service, Asia Pacific. As well, the Women's International House provides guest rooms for international and local groups and individuals such as government agencies, visiting students, professionals and researchers, NGOs and development practitioners, funding agencies, and more.

Institutional Profile

Institutional History

Feminists, who believe that information should be organised and disseminated in ways that a far more accessible and appropriate for women, founded Isis International in 1974 in Rome, Italy. Isis International's thrust of asserting women from the developing South to build their capacities for networking, communications and active participation in development processes, was strengthened when the Isis office relocated from Rome, Italy to Manila, Philippines in 1991. This move allowed Isis International to be geographically closer to its constituencies in Asia and the Pacific, as well as better immersed in the everyday realities of the developing South. Isis International is a 36-year old international feminist development organisation that works for women's empowerment, and active participation and leadership within social justice movements. Isis International's primary approach is through the practice and advancement of feminist development communications. Isis International's strategies are generally directed at challenging development paradigms that are biased towards western male and market-driven interests at local, regional and global levels.

Today, Isis International continues its commitment to work towards women's empowerment for active citizenship, shaped by social justice and respect for diversity. It engages in research, knowledge and capacity building, policy advocacy, and the production and dissemination of multimedia products on cutting edge issues, in close cooperation with women's groups and other civil society organisations.

For the future, as one of its major goals, Isis International intends to intensify its advocacy and capacity building work in feminist development communications. In 2010, with the support of Mama Cash, Isis will be launching the first Activist School for Feminist Development Communications, conducting in-house and on-site education and skills training on the various traditional and alternative media to advocate and address women's development concerns.

Institutional Achievements

Since 1974, Isis has been a *pioneer in feminist development communications* primarily through its community and independent media. Its flagship publication, WiA or Women in Action magazine is one of the oldest feminist publications regionally and internationally. To this day, WiA continues to popularises visions, strategies, and information relevant to women's movements, and challenges dominant discourses on development issues presenting the southern feminist analyses. Isis also continues to venture into both traditional media (including producing publications, films and radio spots) and new ICTs and other multimedia products that effectively promote women's human rights in the developing South.

Isis International has been one of the pioneer feminist organisations that has actively engaged the United Nations, and has been *at the forefront of major global women's events*, including the 4th World Conference on Women in Beijing in 1995, with its consultative status (category II) at the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). In 2003, Isis Intentional was among the women's organisations that facilitated the gender caucus at the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in Geneva, Switzerland. At AWID's International Conference in 2005, Isis lobbied for the importance of understanding the notion of information and society in the context of critiquing its public and private dichotomies. At AWID's International Conference in 2008, Isis sponsored an interactive panel session on "Global Feminist Critical Collaboration: Confronting the Realities of the South."

The *promotion of community and independent media* as one of Isis' flagship advocacy instigated many capacity building projects as well as advocacy activities, particularly in community radio. Realising the high potential of community radio as an affective communication tool for marginalised groups like women, Isis International has conducted many capacity-building activities on community radio that focus on issues such as: women's participation in peace building and disaster management, reproductive and sexual health and rights, combating violence against women, poverty alleviation, women's leadership, and more.

Organisational and Administrative (ODA)

Programme handles the administrative dimensions of the institution ensuring Isis International is an effective organisation, responsive to the needs of its committed staff and its development partners. This includes institutionalising principles and procedures of feminist management, putting into action programmes and policies that generate higher levels of resources, strengthening institutional mechanisms for staff development and implementing efficient planning, monitoring and evaluation systems.

We believe that the evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.


